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

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

Dear Members,

Welcome to 2008 and what is shaping up to be a very busy and active year ahead for us all.

Despite the holiday period, the Committee of the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria has already been very active this year.

In February, we launched our first "Kazzie Communications" where we sent out the registration and nomination forms for the VCE, KYAA and KYA. The Committee and I were very happy with the number of replies received. We received 10 Kastellorizian of the Year Award nominations and may I add that all nominations received were all very worthy of the award. This made it a very difficult task for the Committee to select the

"best" candidate for the 2008 Kastellorizian of the Year Award and I am very happy to announce that John Mangos was selected as this year's recipient of the Kastellorizian of the Year Award.

Also this year we will be awarding two Kastellorizian Youth Achievement Awards, one to Cassandra Zervos for her achievements in Taekwon Do and the other to Nicholas Paltoglou for his success in the areas of music and diving.

The Megisti Tea Club has been an active part of the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria and the organizers Christine Dimer and Cynthia Koutsoukis have informed us that they have another action packed series of functions lined up for 2008. The Megisti Club will start of with their first function, an Easter Ouzeri on April 13th. Further information about this function can be found on page 11 and I hope that you will all continue to support the Megisti Club by attending these functions.

On the 2008 agenda for the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria, is to formulate a Subcommittee to Review the Future Directions of the Association. THE 2008 KASTELLORIZIAN AWARDS

2008 KASTELLORIZIAN OF THE YEAR JOHN MANGOS

John Mangos has been a popular news journalist, charismatic presenter and a familiar face on Australian television screens. His career on national TV extends over approximately thirty years. However his

endeavours extend beyond the boundaries of his career. John was the first "Greek face" on mainstream Australian television and used this to his advantage to encourage Greek culture throughout Australia. He has never denied his Kastellorizian decent and has emphasized alwavs that he Kastellorizian/Greek/Australian. As a media journalist and personality, John has interacted with people from all walks of life and has been deeply affected by those less fortunate. As a result, John has donated his time to many charities and non-profit Therefore it is with great organisations. pleasure that Kastellorizian Association of Victoria announces that John Mangos has been selected the "2008 Kastellorizian of the year".

John's biography reveals that he has met the many criteria required to be a "Kastellorizian of the Year".

John Mangos is of Kastellorizian heritage. His father Constantine "Connie" was born in Melbourne to Kastellorizian parents, John and Evangelia (Christofis) Mangos. John's mother, Dorothy arrived in Australia from Kastellorizo in 1949 (August 15), Dorothy (Diamanto) was a survivor of the Empire Patrol tragedy in 1945 in which 33 people died, and is the youngest daughter of Komninos and Panayiota Zervos. Con Mangos and Dorothy Zervos were married in

1955. The following year, on the 9th of July 1956, John was born. John has two younger brother's Kevin and Michael and a sister, Angela.

John attended Flemington primary school and Moonee Ponds Central and from a young age it was clear that John's smile, charm, kind heartedness and wit were clearly inherited from his affable parents. As a young student John had many role models to help guide him towards his chosen career. John needed to look no further than to his many cousins who had or were embarking in careers in the legal, medical, scientific, finance and business sectors. However, during his school years, he developed his own personality and interests and hobbies. John attended University High where he developed an interest in journalism. A career in journalism appealed to him because it was different from the main stream professions. It also unchartered territory as the profession was predominately Anglo Saxon and entry into the field journalism provided John with a challenge, which he embarked upon with enthusiasm.

John's Involvement in journalism and the Australian Entertainment Industries.

John completed his HSC in 1975 and the following years he undertook studies in Journalism at RMIT. Whilst completing his tertiary education, John worked as a cadet for then Melbourne afternoon newspaper, "The Herald".

In 1979 after John completed his studies and cadetship, he then commenced work at GTV9 as an "on air" reporter. As a result, John made TV history as the first "Greek" journalist reporting on mainstream Australian television. Subsequently, this landmark entry into TV journalism has opened the door for budding journalists from a variety of racial backgrounds into what was a very "Anglo Saxon" dominated industry.

John had role models and mentors in Brian Naylor and Peter Harvey, to help guide him through the early years of his career. In his 14 year career at the Nine Network, John worked as a "newscaster" in the Federal Parliamentary Press Gallery. During this period, he travelled with the then Prime Ministers (Fraser, Hawke, Keating) reporting on the political situation at the time. John also worked as a NSW State Political Correspondent (1984-1986) before he United became the network's States correspondent based in Los Angeles in 1987 and 1988. The time spent in the US allowed John to enhance and expand his expertise as a journalist. The highlights of his overseas experience include an ongoing series on the Primary election campaign and nomination Presidential candidate of Michael Dukakis, the Inauguration in 1989 of President George Bush, the Iran Contra hearings, the Americas Cup campaign in San Diego in 1987, Academy Awards in '87 and '88, whales trapped in Alaska (1988) and a health special on 38 year old Siamese twins. Celebrity interviews included Elizabeth Taylor, Arnold Schwarzenegger, Jane Fonda, Bette Middler, Faye Dunaway, Danny DeVito, Sylvester Stallone, Timothy Dalton, Don Johnson and Sidney Poitier and Sting.

John's return from the States was prompted by the "King" of Australian television, Graham Kennedy with a "too good to be true offer" to co-host Sydney-based news program "Coast to Coast". In 1989 John returned to Australia to fulfil his dream and work alongside Graham Kennedy. "Coast to Coast" aired five nights a week on the Nine Network for just one year (preceded by Graham Kennedy's News Show with Ken Suttcliffe for six months). Some of the memorable scenes from the show were:

- 1. Graham's admission to being dressed from only from the waist up whilst filming "Coast to Coast".
- What Greek could forget the infamous "molivi/ fackilo" or "pencil/envelope" skit and the Easter John partook in cracking of the traditional red Easter eggs with Graham? Much to Graham's surprise the egg was raw.

These "Greek" skits were not, as some people believe, to make fun of the Greeks. In

contrast, Graham had a deep admiration of the Greeks and the skits were performed to promote awareness of the Greek Culture. This reinforced that Greek heritage was something to be proud of and helped to exposed the rest of Australia to the benefits of one's heritage. It was at this point that John became an active advocate of Greek Culture in the wider Australian community.



From the point of view of John's career, Graham Kennedy's impact was seminal. Graham's experience as an entertainer and his mentorship help to make John's transition from on the "Road Reporter" to a Studio Anchor, smooth.

After "Coast to Coast" John made documentaries for the Nine Network such as Reach for the Skies, a special on aviation; Formula 1 Grand Prix- Monte Carlo and A Week in Eastern Europe with Metallica. He hosted "Our World", a documentary series featuring documentaries from Australia and abroad, including the aforementioned). The aired program nationally on Sunday evenings. During the daytime, John was also kept busy. He often appeared as a guest host of Nine's "Today Show" and the "Midday Show".

In 2001 a change was in the wind and John moved to Network Ten to present the Eyewitness news. A year later he was lured back to Nine to became the "international roving" reporter for the "Midday show". Memorable stories that John reported on during this time included the Elephant saving program in Kenya, an Australian doctor who built a hospital in Swaziland, Singapore's Rising Economic Power among the five tigers, a revisit to Los Angeles with an on the road series, a drought special in Australia and a profile of Professor Fred Hollows in Bourke.

John's long and distinguished career was rewarded when the Seven Network offered him his own morning chat show, "At Home with John Mangos", which aired nationally for two years.

John relishes new challenges and constantly tests his limits as well as the boundaries of the media industry. John diversified into "Radio Media" where he was a breakfast announcer on Sydney radio station 2KY (1991-1993). At present, John regularly presents a top rating afternoon program on Sydney talkback radio station 2UE.

In 1993 John launched his own media consultancy company "Megisti Media" and is available for media training, facilitating, as a Master of ceremonies and after dinner speaking.

It was as if the medium of Free-to-air and radio were not enough to challenge John and in another "history making" moment, John also took up the challenges of the newly arrived "Pay TV" industry. It is hard to believe that Pay TV was introduced into Australia as recently as 1996. When SKY NEWS AUSTRALIA was launched in 1996, John became their senior anchorman, a post he holds today.

John is also a weekly regular on Australia's leading breakfast program, the Seven Network's Sunrise. With no claims as a singer, he was most recently in the cast of It Takes Two.

Career Highlights and achievements

John has received many accolades for his excellence in Journalism and the Australian entertainment industry and these honours include:

The Thorn EMI award for excellence in journalism. (1987 Siamese Twins)

Received two Logie nominations (1985 and 1993 Best News story)

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Nomination for Cleo Bachelor of the year (1989) and in the Top 50 eligible bachelors in 1989 as listed by Cleo.

Invited three times (1984, 2003 and 2004) by the Greek Government to attend and report on briefings with Senior Ministers of the Greek Greek Prime Government. the Minister and Greek President (PM President Karamanllis and Stephanopoulos).

Highly commended awards for documentaries (Kenya elephants 1993, Australian Doctor in Swaziland 1994)

In John's opinion, his "crowing glory" and the achievement he is most proud of was his role as "exclusive reporter" for SKY NEWS AUSTRALIA at the Athens 2004 Olympic Games. During this time, John was relocated to Athens for three months before the games. He took great professional nourishment in the celebration of the handover from Sydney to Athens and relished the opportunity to report from Athens on such a major international event.

John's Community Involvement

Despite being such a busy and highly profiled personality, one aspect of John's personality that is not greatly publicized, is his involvement with the community at large. Over the years John has found time to be involved in not only the Kastellorizian and Greek communities but also in the greater Australian community.

<u>Greek and Kastellorizian Community</u> Involvement

John credits his Grandfather John Mangos for being his "earliest and strongest role model". John remembers that his grandfather's was a "very community minded person who had great pride in Kastellorizo and its heritage" and this was clearly evident through his involvement as a member and

also as a former President of the Kastellorizian Association in Melbourne. From John Mangos senior it is clear that John has inherited his sense of community, pride in his Kastellorizian heritage and a strong Greek cultural awareness. It is with these attributes that John enthusiastically involves himself in the Kastellorizian, Greek and Australian Communities.

Throughout his Australian career in journalism John has never denied his Greek heritage and has always extended the fact that he is "Kastellorizian". He has said "I have always believed being Kastellorizian is more than just being Greek. It's a frontier island which has tenaciously retained its Greek identity during numerous occupations. It has jealously guarded its traditions and actively celebrated its uniqueness. It has mothered many children who have gone on to be national and international successes in their fields of endeavour including the sciences, law and the arts". It is because of his deep admiration for Kastellorizo he named his production company "Megisti Media".

John's passion for Kastellorizo doesn't end there. Over dinner in LA, with friend and colleague Jeff McMullin, John managed to convince him and the hardline current affairs show "60 Minutes" to do one off and rare human interest story. In 1988 that feature was filmed on Kastellorizo and later screened on "60 Minutes" in Australia.

Over the past 25 years he has been Master of Ceremonies at the majority of Kastellorizian Balls throughout Australia and several Young Matron's Balls held in Sydney.

But a highlight was as Master of Ceremonies for the Melbourne 80th anniversary ball in 2005.

John is very conscious that being Kastellorizian also means that he is Greek. John has actively involved himself in the Greek Culture and Community as well.

In this role, he has been Master of Ceremonies for many functions held by:

The Greek Orthodox Archdiocese

his local parish in Sydney (annual fundraiser past five years)

John officiated and has been Master of Ceremonies at most of the March 25 functions held in Sydney years in past 25 years.

He has also been the Master of Ceremonies at the Glendi Festivals of Darwin (three times) and Adelaide (once).

In 1980-81 AHEPA recognized John for his involvement in the Greek Community with the "AHEPA Greek of the Year" award.

His experience with both "free-to-air and pay TV industries enabled him to launch Greek Australian Television on Optus Vision (1998-1999) where he hosted a twice-weekly current affairs program specific to Greek Australian issues called Straight Talk and therefore generating awareness of issues important to people of Greek heritage.

Over the past 13 years John has promoted his Hellenic heritage by taking Greek Seafood classes at the Sydney Fish market. John's love for Greek Culture extends beyond Greek food to his love for Greek music. He has proudly brought esteemed Greek vocalists George Dalaras (3 times, 1992, 1996 2004) and Marinella (2004) to Australia. John was honoured at one of Dalaras's concerts when Dalaras publicly stated that he was impressed that a third generation Greek such as John could be so passionate about his heritage. John believes that promotion of Greek music is very

important because it extends Greek culture beyond the diaspora.

Wider Australian Community Involvement

John is emphatic that he is also Australian and frequently donates his time to charity fundraisers which benefits the wider Australian Community.

He was a past Patron of the Make a Wish Foundation (1992-1995).

An original member of the steering committee for the Children's Medical Research Institute and was instrumental in the establishment of Jeans for Genes Day (1992-1995).

He has also been involved in fundraising events for:

The Sydney Children's Hospital,

The Royal Prince Alfred Hospital,

Westmead Hospital,

National Breast Cancer Awareness week,

Prostate cancer awareness week,

SIDs Red Nose days,

Macular Degeneration

Thalasaemia Society.

John is also member of the Variety Club of Australia and has hosted many events for them in their mission to raise money for disadvantaged children.

For the past three years John has hosted the Laiki Bank's annual fundraiser for disadvantaged children called RadioMarathon in both Sydney and Melbourne.

Currently, John is the Patron of:

Trish Cairns Breast Cancer Awareness Foundation at St Vincent's Hospital.

Berries for Kids Cancer Foundation in Sydney and

Ambassador for Day of Difference Foundation (Sophie Delezio).

John is a former board member of environment group Oceanwatch Australia, and Olympic Football Club.

He is an official ambassador for the Sydney Swans and was last year bestowed with a life membership for his twenty years service to the club.

During this busy career, John managed to find time for himself and in 1999 he met Tanny at a television studio in Sydney. Tanny was a guest panellist in her capacity as an economist in a televised debate. Tanny later produced television specials for John for Straight Talk on GATV and the rest, as they say, is history. In 2000 they married.

John lives in Sydney with Tanny and their newly born son, Kosta who was named in true Kazzie/Greek style after his Grandfather Con Mangos.

Nicholas is a highly skilled musician and plays the clarinet with the Scotch College cadets and will tour London with his school this year. During this tour, Nicholas will perform at Buckingham Palace.

Some 250 people attended, most by car and some 90 by the 2 bus coaches. The Kalymnian and Kos clubs set up "kitchens" cooking souvlakia, steaks, sausages, lamb or beef burgers, and drinks etc, but of course many did bring their own food and drinks and shared it around.

The most enjoyable and fun part of the day was when we had the sports activities, where the children and the adults had a lot of old fashion fun and games. We had "races" on the reserve over 30 metres, sprints for Kids under 10 and teens under 18 years; also for the mums and dads. They all also competed in the Egg & Spoon race, the 3 legged race and the Bag (sack) race, most laughs came from the antics of the adults falling over or getting tangled in the bag or dropping the egg and having to eat it. As the day warmed up some of the girls went swimming or sun baking, whilst the "boys" with George Verginis included were seen playing football. The day was most enjoyable for all and most agreed it should be held every year. The day officially came to a reluctant close when the 2 buses left at 5pm; however the rest staved on and mingled, played cards or backgammon or just talked about what a great day they had.

FEATURE ARTICLES

GREEK CULTURE:

As we are about to embark on the Easter Period and Saints Constantine and Helen's Day on the 21st of May, the following articles are timely, interesting and informative.



ORTHODOX EASTER

Almost every year, the Orthodox Easter differs from the Western culture and it is certainly very tricky to explain to non-Orthodox followers in Australian society. Hopefully the following can help in the interpretation of "why" this is the case.

The Greek Orthodox Church calculates the date of Easter according to a canon law that was adopted and goes back to the year 325. Easter is determined on the old Julian Calender as the first Sunday after the full moon following the vernal equinox. Jewish Passover must always be before Orthodox Easter. The Greek Orthodox Church use the Julian Calender for Easter and the Lent and Pentecost are also dependent on it. The Julian Calender is thirteen days behind the new "Gregorian" Calender on which the remaining Greek Orthodox Calender is based.

THE CELEBRATION OF SAINTS CONSTANTINE AND HELEN

Kastellorizian legend implies that Constantine the Great, Emperor of Rome and his mother Helen, sought refuge from a serve storm on Kastellorizo during their journey to the Holy Land. In gratitude, they set the foundations of a church to be dedicated to St John the Baptist. They also placed the island under their patronage.

According to historian of Kastellorizo, Dr Vardamidis this legend was resurrected when in 1835; the old St John was entirely renovated. The Kastellorizians of that time wanted to re-dedicate the church to Saints Constantine and Helen. The story that Vardamidis tells is not clear. He confirms that on the site of the present day church of St Constantine and Helen there was an older church dedicated to St John, which was demolished by the architect Nicholas Protomastorou.

During the long battle for Greek Independence from the Ottomans, the Kastellorizians requested permission from the Grand Porte in Istanbul to erect and dedicate the church to Saints Constantine and Helen. The Ottoman authorities were not impressed because the name of the last Byzantine emperor was Constantine the XI and saw this move by the Kastellorizians as an act of defiance against the Ottoman rule and a support for the Greek Independence movement. The Ottoman authorities granted permission for a church on the condition that the Church was to be dedicated to "All Saints" and not to Saints Constantine and Helen. The Kastellorizians insisted that the church be dedicated to St Constantine and St Helen and resurrected the legend that Constantine and Helen are the Patron Saints of Kastellorizo and with the help of a cash "donation" to the authorities, permission for the church to be named Saints Constantine and Helen was finally granted.

Protomastorou rebuilt the church and it includes twelve Dorian columns which were transported from the ancient temple of the oracle of Patara of Lycia in Asia Minor. The

church further contains a capola of pointed arches; three hypostases, and the internal embellishments of the church and a large silver plate icon of St Constantine and St Helen which was gift from Captain Katsonis. According to the Prussian Professor Ross, who visited the island in 1850 the estimated cost to build the church was 300,000 Turkish piaster or 20,000 Prussian dollars, a fortune at that time.

Based on the above legend, one could be convinced that St Constantine and St Helen were the Patron Saints of Kastellorizo. However, there are many reasons to believe that St Nicholas is the rightful, Patron Saint of Kastellorizo and not St Constantine and Helen

Historical evidence documented by Eusevius of Ceasaria, St Ambrose and Rufinus of Aquileia, all detail the archaeological expedition and list the discoveries made by Augusta Helena on the way to, during and from the "Holy Land". Their records:

- 1. Does not refer to the storm and trip to Kastellorizo.
- 2. They all claim that after Constantine the Great became Emperor, he did not visit the "Holy Land".
- 3. They all list in great detail the names of the churches built by Constantine and his mother throughout the Byzantine Empire however there is no mention in the list of the church of St John on Kastellorizo.

Evidence to support the claims that St Nicholas is the Patron Saint of Kastellorizo is:

- 1. St Nicholas was the Metropolitan of Myra of which Kastellorizo was a parish.
- 2. The common seal of the Kastellorizo features the Icon of St Nicholas.

- 3. The oldest church in the old castle was dedicated to St Nicholas.
- 4. The main festival of the island is held December 4, 5, and 6th known as "Nicolovarvara", the celebration of Saints Barbara, Savvas and Nicholas
- 5. Documented in the Kastellorizian folk songs, the Kastellorizian pray to St Nicholas and commence with "St Nicholas with his curly beard "Agia Nicola ton Myron met ta psara ta yenia".
- 6. St Nicholas is the Patron Saint of Sailors and the predominant occupation of the Kastellorizians were sailors.

So from my research it is clear to me that St Nicholas is the Patron Saint of Kastellorizo and not Saints Constantine and Helen. So I ask why do we celebrate Saint Constantine and Helen's Day instead of St Nicholas here in Melbourne.

Yet another Kazzie mystery!

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GENEALOGY

Whilst, we as Kastellorizian are trying to document our genealogical history and search for our "roots", it seems that we are not alone!

The pursuit to document one's family connections is common amongst many different ethnic groups and in January of this year, SBS began airing a program on this topic.

The TV series is called "Who do you think you are?" It features both a British and an Australian series. Notable personalities go in search of their family backgrounds. The program is intriguing as the personalities find out many interesting family connections and some skeletons that were hidden in their family closets. It highlights just how rewarding and addictive genealogy can be.

The program also gives many helpful hints to the novice genealogist about how to start collecting and documenting your own family tree

Some of those tips include:

- 1. Interview relatives for family history and stories.
- 2. Search for Birth, marriage and death certificates.
- Immigration records and passenger manifests.
- 4. Convict records (if applicable)
- 5. Census records.
- 6. How to record your information.

"Who do you think you are?" is screened on Sunday evenings at 7.30 pm on SBS. The Australian series is repeated on Friday nights at 7.30pm and includes Kate Cebrano, Kathy Freeman and Dennis Cometti.

PUTTING TOGETHER FAMILY MEMORIES by Connie Gregory.

I do not claim to be a particularly skilled interviewer, but I have submitted this simple little interview with my husband's aunt, Jessie Pappamatheos, to encourage readers to do the same with their own family members who may remember life on Kastellorizo, or who might remember particular customs they practised in Kastellorizo or in Australia.

At the start of the interview Jessie said she didn't remember anything, but persevering with questions produced some really interesting material. For instance I learnt more about my mother-in-law Eftihia's creative skills; I was given the name of the ship on which they arrived in Australia and was able to search and obtain the shipping records; I got the recipe for the Koulouria; and a picture of everyday life emerged. I also obtained more information to add to my knowledge of St Fanourios. So in one short fifteen minute interview I gained lots of information to put in my album alongside the photograph of the Palassis family house.

Interviews do not need to be lengthy – short bursts are good. And remember people are relying on their memories so dates may not always be accurate, but don't get stuck on dates and just go with the flow.

Another way of getting information is just to ask to be told a story about anything at all – and listen and save your questions until the end of the story.

AN INTERVIEW WITH JESSIE (DIONISIA) PAPPAMATHEOS (NEE PALASSIS)

When did you leave Kastellorizo?

I was eight years of age. I was born in 1931. Georgia was 17. I was born when my sister Assimina was already married with a baby – Rene. So my niece was born before me.

Do you remember the house on the waterfront?

When we left Kastellorizo we didn't place a plaque on the house to say it was ours.

Tell me some of the household activities that you remember?

I don't remember anything.

Well, did you make your own soap, where did you do the washing, that sort of thing – you must remember something?

With a bit more prompting Jesse recalls -

Before dawn we kneaded the bread twice a week to take to the baker for cooking before

the rest of the family got up. If the girls took it they went very early so that they would not be seen, by the back streets. The baker would deliver it later.

Do you remember your father?

I was only one when my father died. Assimina and Anastasia (her older sisters) were already in Australia and married when my father died. (Later Jessie says her father died in 1935so that she would have maybe a bit older when he died – so dates need to be checked again).

What did you have for breakfast?

We drank tea, the goat had milk, and paximadakia, honey and cheese.

What did you do during the day? How did the house run?

The house was cleaned, and then they would do their crocheting and gold thread embroidery. My sister Eftihia did all the Kastellorizian costume samplers. Potsaki, the main bed was made up of kilim carpet, strosi (cotton mattress with goat's hair), Setchetez, sheet and Paploma.

We had kerosene lamps, a wood stove and pump for water – a "yisterna" in the basement caught the rain water. Eftihia kept the gutters clean so that the water caught was nice and clean – she climbed up on the roof.

I don't remember anything else. We came to Australia in 1939 on the "San Remo" – my mother, (Chrissiroy Palassis, nee Petrides), George, Giorgia, Effie and Jessie. Giorgia was killed in a car accident not long after arriving in Australia. The others – Michael, Nick, Assimina and Anastasia – were already in Australia.

When you went back to Kastellorizo you must have had some memories. Did you?

When I went back forty years later I couldn't remember anything, but I saw the corner where I came home from school and

everything came back and I looked up to where our house was and I remembered seeing my mother when I was a little girl and she was sitting at the window and embroidering and waiting for me. She used a "Tillaro" – an embroidery hoop.

They made slippers, some in silk and cotton and also gold thread ones for the Gambro (groom) and Nifi (bride)

I remember my mother making avgoutariko. We used to bring the fish roe from Anatolia, place it in brine for 24 hours and then sun dry it and then when it was dry she used to dip it in candle wax.

Did you make your own candles?

Mum always made the candles for Easter a week before. Beeswax. They all made their own candles. Eftihia was the creative one. She used to make silk. She kept worms. We had a big mulberry tree. She would spin the silk, and then she would buy the dyes (they probably came from Italy) to dye the silk. (The mulberry tree at the back of the house is still there).

Jessie said she didn't remember any more, but with lots of prompting more memories were elicited:

When my brothers were out in the boats and it was stormy weather we packed a cane basket (Kalathi) with food and we would walk up to the top to the Plakes and we would then go to St Stephanos church and light the candles and pray for them to come home safely.

At Easter time they would have a fete at the Church and they would have stalls and tables and chairs and there was entertainment. If you were a nifi, the gambro would take the Mantilli with sweets in it for the nifi, and they (the nifi's family?) would send trays of sweets and macaroons. If you visited a house over Easter you would get a bag of sweets.

The young women were allowed to be seen at Easter, - they were usually kept at home.

Girls could only swim in the early hours of the morning.

My mother made beautiful koulouria. On 30 November, St Andrew's day, they made Loukoumathes. When she baked she always sent sweets to the poorer people, and when she left Kastellorizo she was always sending money for the poor, especially at Easter. She did that for years.

Do you remember anything about St Fanourios on Kastellorizo?

Yes, his feast is in August (actually the 27th). They made Fanouropita, and would say "Faneroseme Kati" (means Fanourious grant me something). They lit fires outside the church and the kids were jumping over them.

WHAT ANZAC DAY MEANS TODAY.

ANZAC day is celebrated on the 25th of April each year and is a day of commemoration and remembrance. The day marks the anniversary of the landing of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps on the Gallipoli Peninsula. The battle of Gallipoli began at dawn on April 25th 1915 and lasted eight months and resulted in some 25,000 Australian casualties.

In 1916, April 25th was officially named 'Anzac Day' by the Acting Prime Minister, George Pearce and since then services have been held yearly. Following the Second World War, ANZAC Day not only was a day to remember the sacrifice, courage, endurance and mateship of the soldiers of the battle of Gallipoli, it also became a day on which to commemorate the lives of

Australians and New Zealanders lost in World war II.

Today the meaning of ANZAC Day has been further broadened to include those who were killed, injured and participated in <u>all military operations</u> in which the Australian and New Zealand soldiers were involved. Some of those participants were of Kastellorizian decent. The list of Kastellorizian participants in these events is recorded on the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria's "Honour" board that is on display at our Clubrooms.

From the ever increasing number of attendees at ANZAC Day dawn services and marches through out Australia, ANZAC Day appears to promote a sense of National unity. People from all political backgrounds, beliefs, racial backgrounds and aspirations appear to share a genuine sorrow at the loss of so many lives in war.

In this day and age and with all our wisdom, War still prevails. Today that war is against terrorism. Regardless of your views on the current Wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, many Australians for whatever reasons, are providing expertise and their services to support the policies of the Australian government in their stand against global terrorism.

As ANZAC day is upon us it seems fitting to reflect on the duties that Australian-Kazzie, Theodore Panagacos has undertaken in Iraq for Australia. I would like to thank Theodore for taking the time to tell us about his experience in Iraq.

THEODORE PANAGACOS IN IRAQ 2007

Theodore Panagacos, the son of George and Yvonne Panagacos and grandson of Maria Kominos and the late Kevin Kominos has worked as a civilian with the Department of Defence in Canberra since 2003 and was deployed to Iraq to serve alongside Coalition Forces in Operation IRAQI FREEDOM. Part

of Theodore's role was to lead a team of twenty Australian and American analysts and report on political, military and energy infrastructure developments taking place during that time. Theodore's work contributed to the highly publicised report presented by Multi-National Forces Commander. General David Petraeus to the President of the United States, the US Secretary of Defense and Congress last September. In recognition of his work, Theodore was awarded the U.S. Army Commander's Award for Civilian Service. In describing the experience of his deployment, Theodore stated:

"Regardless of the reasons for being there, it was amazing to see the progress being made on the ground in Iraq. People's lives were changing daily for the better. The economy improved, violence dropped to sustainable levels, and the government made steps, albeit incrementally. expediting at reconciliation between ethnic groups. My branch and I worked very hard - usually 16 hour days - to ensure our leaders made precise, calculated decisions in providing the best support to Iraqi government. All members of the Coalition Forces were committed to seeing Iraq prosper, and I have no doubt that when I left, the country was on the right track towards being a future power of the Middle East. However, such progress will take time.

KAZZIE KERASMA

Easter is the most revered and celebrated of all the spiritual rituals of the Greek Orthodox Calender. In some parts of Greece, the Sunday before Clean Monday (Kathara Deftera) there is a custom to eat an egg at the end of the meal, following which the accompanying phrase is said "With an egg I close my mouth and with an egg I shall open my mouth once again". The closure of one's mouth represents the six week period of "Great Lent" and the egg which breaks the fast is the egg refers to the dyed red which is broken to celebrate Christ's resurrection following Anastasi.

One of the many things that help to make Easter special is the tradition of breaking the "Red Egg". Every Kazzie home, as is the case in most Greek households, baskets are filled with dyed Red eggs which are offered to newly arrived guests to select and partake in the egg cracking ritual with their hosts.

Preparation of the dyed eggs traditional is carried out on Holy Thursday or "Kokkinopempti" (Red Thursday). Eggs can also be dyed on Holy Saturday or any other day of Lent with the exception of Good Friday.

Traditionally the eggs are dyed red to symbolize the blood that Christ shed on the cross at the crucifixion. The cracking of the egg symbolises the opening of the Tomb and the resurrection of Christ.

The most religious of Greek Orthodox followers will place the first red egg dyed (also known as the egg of Virgin Mary) or the one collected from the "Anastasi" or the midnight mass service held on Holy Saturday evening, at the household's ikonostasi to protect the family from the "evil eye".

Red eggs are also used to decorate Easter Tsoureki and "avgoules" or large Koulorakia.

The ritual of cracking the red egg can be enacted over the next 40 days following the Anastasi.

There is of course an art to the cracking of the red egg. One must select an egg that is shiny with even dye coverage. This reflects a good hard shell. Check for hair-line cracks and place the egg in your hand with the pointed end facing up.

Select a worthy opponent and decide between you who will hold the "upper" (hand up, egg point facing down) and "lower" (hand below and egg point facing up) positions. Then person with the upper position will hit the egg held by the person in the lower position. At this time, you say "Xristos Anesti" (Christ has risen) and your opponent will reply "Alithos Anesti" (He has truly risen). And you then move on to the next person in the room and repeat the process. The person's egg which is not broken is considered the winner and will be blessed with good fortune through out the coming year.

Good Luck!

In this day and age, when time is precious it is easy to use a commercial dye to colour your eggs red. In days gone by, traditional methods of dying eggs using a variety of vegetables as the source of natural dyes. I will give you both recipes.

"KOKKINA AVGA" RED DYED EASTER EGGS USING COMMERCIAL FOOD DYE

INGREDIENTS

Approximately 12 to 24 eggs Water 3/4 cup Vinegar Red food dye or coloring* Vegetable oil

UTENSILS

A large, preferably old saucepan Cotton Balls

METHOD

- 1. Wash and dry each egg carefully.
- 2. Boil a large pot of water.
- 3. Add a red dye or food coloring and 3/4 cup of vinegar to the water.
- 4. Boil for a few minutes.
- 5. Slowly lower the eggs into the pot, and when the water comes to a boil, lower the heat to a simmer.
- 6. Simmer eggs for 15 min and remove carefully from the pot.
- 7. Before cooking more eggs, add an additional 2 tbs. vinegar to the water.
- 8. Wipe cooked/dyed eggs with an oil-soaked cotton ball.
- 9. Wipe each egg again with a clean dry cloth.
- 10. Place in a basket.
- 11. Serve cold following the "Anastasi Church Service" and for the next 40 days.

* Red Food dye can be purchased from any Greek Delicatessen or good Supermarket or Market.



ONION SKIN DYED RED EASTER EGGS "Natural dye recipe"

INGREDIENTS

Approximately 12 fresh and uncooked Eggs at room temperature
Water
3/4 cup White Vinegar
Golden/Brown Onion Skins for the coloring
Vegetable/Olive Oil

UTENSILS

An old large Stainless Steel Saucepan Strainer Bowl Slotted spoon Paper towel or cotton wool

METHOD

- 1. Wash and dry each egg carefully.
- 2. Make Dye.
 - a. Place the skins of 15 onions in a saucepan.
 - b. Add 2 tablespoons white vinegar and 4.5 cups of water
 - c. Bring to boil and simmer covered for 30 minutes.
 - d. Strain orange coloured dye into a glass bowl and cool to room temperature.
- 3. Add 12 eggs, dye to a stainless steel saucepan. Make sure eggs are in a single layer. Cover eggs with the dye form step 2.

- 4. Bring to boil over medium heat.
- 5. Lower heat and simmer for 12-15 minutes, then check eggs for red colour. Do not cook for more than a total of 20 minutes. If eggs are not red enough after 20 minutes leave in the pot and remove from heat. When the pot has cooled, place in refrigerator and let sit until desired color is reached.
- 6. If the colour is to your liking (after 12 20 minutes) remove eggs with a slotted spoon and cool on rack or in egg cartons
- 7. When cooled coat lightly with oil, polish with paper toweling
- 8. Place in a basket.
- 9. Serve cold following the Anastasi Service.

Helpful hints:

Save onion skins in a plastic bag in the refrigerator until ready to use.

Do not use any porous (wood, ceramic, plastic, etc.) materials as they can be colored by the dye.

If stainless cookware and utensils get colored by the dye, wash with regular detergent and a small amount of chlorine. Rinse very well.

BE CREATIVE AND DECORATE!



Easter time is also a time when all the family can participate in the preparations and festivities and I have included some hints and ideas on how to decorate the dyed eggs that you can also involve your children or grandchildren.

Although Greek Orthodox followers do not generally dye their eggs colours other than red, many other Eastern Orthodox faiths do. Why not dye eggs in different colours? Commercial dyes also come in green, blue and yellow. For recipe follow the commercial dye recipe and check the packet for manufactures instructions.

Add a decorative pattern on your eggs. After colouring your eggs, add some stickers.

Use commercial dyes to achieve a two toned or two colour effect. Dye the eggs first in the lighter colour, allow the dye to dry. Apply sticky dots or magic tape and dye again in a darker colour. Remove the tape when the eggs are cooled and expose the pattern in the lighter colour. Make sure you reduce the cooking time to 7 to 10 minutes in each different colour dye to avoid overcooking the eggs.

Or use a traditional "decorative" approach. This method was given to me by a Greek Cypriot friend. Place a small leaf or pressed flower on the egg shell. Put the egg in a nylon stocking tie a knot tightly at each end so the leaf or flower does not move. Place the stocking with eggs into the dye and follow either recipe provided. When eggs are cooked, allow to cool before removing from stocking and polish.



The funeral service of the Late **Irene Piperoglou** was held at "The Entrance of our Lady to the Temple" Greek Orthodox Church on Saturday the 19th of January 2009 by Parish Priest Rev. Nikolas and the Very Rev lakovos from "Sts Anargyiri" Oakliegh. A Trisagion service was held a few fays prior by Rev. Father Minas "Evangelismos" Church for very close family.

The follow Eulogy was read at the funeral and written by son DR Michael V Piperoglou.

Irene Miriklis was born in Melbourne on June 12 1929. She was the third eldest of nine children to Michael and Anna Miriklis who migrated to Australia via Egypt from the island of Kastellorizo following the war with Turkey in 1929.

She, like her brothers and sisters, received little formal education, due to the need to help out such a large family. She did however receive on the job training from her mother in child rearing and housekeeping and from her father in how to run a successful seafood business. These were skills she put to good use later in life.

From an early age, she was a hard worker with high energy levels.

She married Vasilios (Bill) Piperoglou in September 1949. Bill, who had recently arrived from Kastellorizo, fell for her good looks and charm. The marriage was a classic union between the old world customs of Kastellorizo and the retained traditions of Melbourne born Kastellorizians. In this regard, Irene proudly and diligently served the Kastellorizian women's Society as Treasurer over a number of years.

Tragically, her first child Anastasios was born with a birth defect. Fortunately, God blessed them with another son, Stanley in 1951. Michael followed in 1955.

The boys, including Bill were the love and focus of her life. There was little time for her own recreational pursuits. She worked long hours with Bill in Milk Bars and later Fish and Chip shops, as well as keeping her house in

an immaculate condition. The home made fish cakes she made in the shop at Williamstown were Legendary with customers as well as being popular with Stanley and Michael.

Irene was extremely proud of her two sons and always encouraged them to work and study hard. She was thrilled when they both completed university studies and became highly respected and successful in their chosen careers.

When husband Bill became ill with a neurological disorder in 1979, she swapped careers becoming a full time nurse and carer to him. At one point she was maintaining two houses in a spotless state in Vermont and Phillip Island where Bill enjoyed the sea air.

Bill final succumbed to his illness and passed away in 1989. Irene's life was never the same although she did try to remain active and positive. She got into gardening at the unit she was living in and enjoyed knitting whilst watching some of her favorite television programs which included "Better Homes and Gardens", "Burke's backyard" any documentary on Royalty. Coincidently, in this regard, two days before passed away she really enjoyed watching a documentary on the "Greek Royal Family", which she discussed in depth with her niece Anna Miriklis-Defteros the following day.

She also was able to go on group holidays including one overseas to the Chelsea Garden Show in England.

Her own failing health and frailty led her to book herself into a serviced apartment "Roseville Apartments" – King Street Doncaster East, about six years ago. Here, she remained fiercely independent but enjoyed the socialization with other women who were all older that her. Her knitting reached another level as she keenly began producing woolen garments for overseas children in third world countries.

With God's help, she fought off death one year ago when a major stroke left her in a

coma with no speech. Her rehabilitation from this largest stroke was nothing short of a miracle and showed her to be full of guts and determination. She knew her time to meet God was near and spoke in a matter of fact way about this. She was however, never morbid or depressed about it.

As well as her sons, she was especially close to her grandchildren, Irini, Vasili, Andoni, and Vasilley. May they carry on her proud sense of family, determination to succeed and strong will even under adversity.

We have all been privileged to have known you Irene.

May God rest her soul.


