The Kastellorizian Association of Victoria initiated the Kastellorizian of the Year Award in 1993. It is the only award of its kind in Australia. It is awarded annually to an individual of Kastellorizian descent, whose achievements have been an inspiration to the Kastellorizian communities of Australia and an example to the generations that will follow. The recipient of the award serves as a role model to our youth, showing them that they, also, have the ability to pursue and achieve a career of high distinction.

We thank Professor Ernest Demetrios Hondros for his acceptance of this award.

Professor E.D.Hondros will make the long trip from London to be at our Club Rooms to receive this award, on Sunday 22ND May 2005.

Profile of E.D.HONDROS:

Anastasios (Tasso) Demetrios Hondros was born in Kastellorizo, to Demetrios Hondros and Athanasia Paleologos. When he was eight years old, he and his family moved to North Queensland, Australia, to escape the Second World War.

Anastasios could not speak any English when he started his education at the Cairns State Primary School. After completing his schooling at the Cairns State High School, his parents moved to Melbourne, in 1947, where he was able to attend Melbourne University, gaining his Masters and Doctor of Science. He was invited to further his studies at the Paris University, which led to his extensive European career.

In 1968 he was married to his beautiful wife, Kristine Garder-Olsen. Kristine and Tasso have two sons; Dimitri Alexandros, who holds a Masters in Economics from Essex University and currently works in Thessalonike; Constantine who holds a Masters in Science from Edinburgh University and currently works in Holland.

Tasso and Kristine live in London, vacationing in Kastellorizo every year for the past 35 years. When Tasso is not working at the Imperial College, London, he tries to be at his home in Mandraki, Kastellorizo.

Professor Hondros is a very private, modest man.

The list of credentials, on the opposite page, speaks for him.

EXPLANATORY NOTES

The Petten Establishment was set up in the 1960'a as a nuclear research facility. In the 1970's nuclear research was de-emphasized but nuclear materials testing and evaluation remained an important function until 1996.

As the Director of the Institute for Advanced Materials, Ernest Hondros was credited with the development of the Institute, over a ten year period, into a first rate research laboratory, establishing an international reputation in materials science.

The Royal Society.

The Royal Society of London was founded in 1660 by scientist including Robert Boyle, John Wilkins and Christopher Wren. Since its early history, the Society has elected scientists, engineers and technologists to become members of its Fellowship.

The Society is made up the most eminent scientists, engineers and technologists from the UK and the Commonwealth. Each year the Fellows elect 44 new Fellows, chosen from across the science, engineering and medicine spectrum –an honour regarded as the highest accolade a scientist can receive and next only to a Nobel Prize. They also elect six Foreign Members each year.

Today, Fellows of the Royal Society include Nobel prize-winning scientists such as Paul Nurse (cancer researcher) and Peter Mansfield (whose work led to the development of magnetic resonance imaging or MRI). Other Fellows include mathematician and physicist Stephen Hawking; IVF and stem cell research pioneer Anne McLaren and inventor of the worldwide web, Tim Berners-Lee.

The Academia Europaea is a functioning European Academy of Humanities, Letters and Sciences, composed of individual members. Membership is by invitation.

Invitations are made only after peer group nomination, scrutiny and confirmation as to the scholarship and eminence of the individual in their chosen field.

Election is confirmed by the Council of the Academy.

Members are drawn from across the whole European continent.

C.M.G: Commander of the Order of St. Michael and St. George - a British award conferred by Queen Elizabeth. It was presented to Professor Hondros for "services to European sciences".

Imperial College London is a part of the University of London.

The College has been enlarged since 1988 to incorporate a growing medical component.

The full title of the college is **The Imperial College of Science**, **Technology and Medicine**. The Governance of the college consists of **the Court** of the Imperial College of S, T&M and **the Council** of the Imperial College of S, T, &M.

The Court has over 150 members and incorporates representatives of all the learned institutions and royal societies associated with the pursuits and disciplines of the College.

External members come from local councils, Parliament, teachers associations and include representatives from commonwealth countries. Twenty four elected academic staff and four elected academic related staff will serve on the Court for four years.

Professor Ernest Hondros is the representative of The Royal Society at the Court.

BREAKING NEWS!!!!!!!!!!!:-

THE CASTELLORIZIAN CLUB of N.S.W. held its annual general meeting for 2004 last night (Tuesday 19th April, 2005), resulting in a major shake up of the board.

The President, **John M. Barbouttis**, and Treasurer, **Nicholas J. Malaxos**, lost their positions on the Board, along with **Katina Nicholas**, **Luke Mavrocordatos** and **Jim Condylios**.

Of the Board of nine members, those who remained were **Angelo G. Hatsatouris**, **Harley Economou**, **Dianne Balafoutis** and **Nicholas G. Pappas**. The newcomers to the Board, and possible saviours of the Club, are **Nicholas Moraitis**, **Antony Roditis**, **Terry Panigiris**, **Michael Alexander** and **Theodore Pettaras**.

Over the last two years, the number of fully paid up members eligible to vote has declined from about 2,900 to 1,200. The Club has been loosing money at the rate of \$10,000 per week for two years, or more, borrowing heavily against the equity in the \$10M building in Kingsford, in order to keep the Club going.

The outgoing Committee held the A.G.M., last night, for the year 2004, and therefore was only required to produce financials to year end 31st March 2004. The new Committee will have a huge job ahead, to turn this business around. Many of the Ladies in the Castellorizian Ladies Auxiliary were very supportive of the election of **Nicholas Moraitis**, who is a very successful businessman and has the experience needed to rebuild the Club. Nick Moraitis and the Committee will be ably supported by **Avgoulla Hendrickson**, the new General Manager of the Castellorizian Club, since December 2004, who has already stopped the hemorrhaging of \$10,000 per week and has gradually edged the Club "out of the Red and into the Black". The Committee of the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria congratulates the new committee members of the Sydney Castellorizian Club and wishes them unbridled success.

I would like to extend my best wishes to the new incoming Board of Directors of the Kastellorizian Association and hope that they enjoy a successful term in office. I would also like to congratulate the "I.T." committee for the very professional presentation of the Association's new website at the recent A.G.M. I would at this point like to express my disappointment of some of the decisions made by some members of the committee without fully consulting the outgoing committee.

- 1. Those nominations for the new Board would only be accepted from members of the Association who are connected to the Internet. I feel that this is highly discriminative and ignoring the fact that many members have a lot to offer without being computer literate.
- 2. I also disagree that a member of the Board need not attend meetings so long as he/she is in contact via email. I ask how can that member take part in any discussions or vote on matters that may occur at any one meeting.

Dear Christina,

Thank you for expressing your concerns. We welcome your letter and are happy to print it, as requested, and to be given the opportunity to respond to these concerns. The decisions which you complain of have evolved because of time constraints placed on committee members in endeavouring to run a social club alongside every day work, family, business and personal commitments.

In response to your two concerns: -

1. The ability to communicate by email was a preference sought by both of us, with the intention of allowing the committee to function more efficiently, and in a fairer manner. We have found that it is quicker and more accurate to send an email describing a job done, or to be done, than to make a phone call. By sending the email to the target person and copying to the rest of the committee, everyone knows what is being done and who is doing it. All this is achieved with one email instead of six phone calls.

When half the committee has email contact and the other half doesn't, the situation becomes "highly discriminative" **against** the ones who do not have email. They end up being excluded from the information traffic and consequent decision making, which evolves, when committee members have easy access to each other. When this occurs, clique groups form within a committee, creating a situation which is unfair to the email deprived members and leads to the erosion of committee morale. The obvious solution is for someone to phone-around to the members who are not email linked, and "to bring them up to speed". Who has the time to do this after each group-email?

2. As explained in the Open Letter to Members, which was issued at the A.G.M on 28th November 2004, the new committee wants to run the committee proceedings on a business basis, not as a social get-together. By taking the pressure off people having to attend every committee meeting, we can attract busy, talented people who would like to contribute some ideas and time to the club but who are afraid of being caught in a committee, which may waste valuable time. Technology now allows committees to discuss issues at length via email or phone link-up, and to reach a consensus, which can be voted on at the designated meetings, as long as a quorum exists.

We are very conscious of your concerns and accept your point 'that many members have a lot to offer without being computer literate'. As you know, our committee needs these people too. Without their support, without your support, our club will fail. We all need each other; and we need better ways to communicate with each other.



STEPHEN ZOMBOS

A Tribute to Our Dad 5/08/1925 - 15/03/2005

Dad, together with his sisters Christina, Evangelia and their mother, our Yiayia Evdokia, left the tiny island of Kastellorizo to come to the shores of Australia with the belief that the "streets were lined with gold".

Dad's older brothers, our uncles Kosta and Andonis, had already established themselves in Melbourne a year or so earlier and assisted their mother and siblings with their passage to Australia. They arrived on the 24th of November 1938. The sense of family, of being there for one's loved ones or "oikoyenia" was a very strong trait in the Zombos household and remains so to this day.

Dad was thirteen years of age when enrolled at Richmond Primary School. This proved to be a most humiliating experience for him at the time. He was a tall, thin, dark skinned kid with a funny crew cut—speaking a strange language and having arrived from a place that hardly anyone had ever heard of. Dad described himself as the "punching bag" for the school bullies. He was often referred to as "Mr. Dago". There was nothing "gold lined" about that particular experience.

Dad's saviour at school was in the form of a Miss Smith (a Prep teacher) who felt compassion for him and began to teach him basic words in English. She would show him visual examples, such as an apple or point to her hand and slowly mouth the words "ap-ple", or "ha-nd" to him. Dad had much admiration for this gentlewoman. We believe Miss Smith inspired Dad to educate himself and become articulate in this language. Tinges of gold were beginning to show in the background.

Dad left school after a very short period to provide for his mother and sisters and simultaneously ease the financial burden of his brothers. Through hard work and dedication, Dad reaped the benefits that Australia was able to offer him. By his early twenties he had become the successful owner of several businesses. Success however, was insignificant for Dad unless it could be shared with his family. Our cousin Jim Calmer loves to tell the story when Dad, in a state of euphoria decorated his dining room table in ten pound notes after an unusually busy day's trade in his milk bar near the Melbourne Cricket Ground, during

the Olympic Games in 1956. Dad's purpose was to show that the money belonged to the family, not to him.

Dad continued with his self-education. He read countless books on history, geography and religion. Dad had become an erudite man who loved telling stories and sharing his extensive general knowledge with everyone. His dry sense of humour made the sometimes 'tedious' facts more bearable to listen to. We already miss him saying "Did you know that it was the Ancient Greeks who..."

Dad's fortune was finally declared when he met Mum soon after The Games. This was a profoundly happy time for Dad. Jim and his recently deceased brother Chris helped Dad in the milk bar. Dad adored these two nephews as he did all his nieces and nephews.

Dad married Mum in February 1957. Mum was his Mediterranean beauty and she fell for his movie star looks. It was then that our Yiayia said "don't let this girl go" – he didn't and followed his heart. They had established their family of two "darling daughters", "ta mora mou" by 1959.

Dad, together with Mum, then proceeded to open his home to countless family members over the years and his generosity and hospitality continued throughout his life... The addition of five beautiful grandchildren and a son-in-law further added to his success story.

He had finally found his "streets lined with gold".

KASTELLORIZO RESIDENTS PROTEST AGAINST 'ILLEGAL' LAND ENCROACHMENTS.

The idyllic island of Kastellorizo is in the middle of a flurry of court cases concerning land encroachments at the expense of islanders living in Australia and abuse of public funds. Over the last few months, the small community of Kastellorizo, Greece's easternmost island, has been seething as accusations of illegal encroachments on land owned by fellow islanders from Australia gather steam. As a result, legal actions have been flying thick and fast and the island has split into two camps.

The Court of First Instance prosecutor on the chief island in the Dodecanese archipelago, Rhodes, has stepped into the fray and launched legal proceedings against the mayor for financial irregularities.



Numerous other cases are coming before the courts. Kathimerini went to the remote island and spoke with local leaders and residents. Accusations were bandied about, ranging from the production of documents on the basis of municipal rolls to the issuing of permits for the island's stores.

In the most serious concerned land encroachments, allegedly, a group of islanders looks out for plots of land that have not been claimed or used recently by their owners (who in most cases are fellow islanders who have migrated to Australia). It then reputedly produces witnesses who falsely testify to third parties' occupancy of the land for 20 years (as provided for by the law on adverse possession and corresponding forfeiture of ownership). When they have secured the property, residents allege, their new owners then sell it on, usually to citizens of other European countries.

"Many of these accusations are already subject to legal proceedings," Giorgos opposition leader Papoutsis, and municipal councilor on Megisti, Kastellorizo's other name, told Kathimerini. "It's not possible that those who remained on Kastellorizo have 10 landholdings each. Some of them have even encroached on public property".



The expatriate Society for the Revival of Megisti, which is based in Sydney, Australia, in September, sent a letter to Aegean and Island Policy Minister, Aristotelis Pavlidis, laying out the problem in detail, and asking him to intervene.


At the same time, the opposition bloc on the municipal council is pressing ahead with charges of misuse of public money by the municipality.

9. "We have indications and evidence, during the period 1995-2002 and Mayor Pavlos Panigyris's tenure, of financial irregularities in the municipality. The mayor himself charged invoices for building materials to the municipality and then used them to build his hotel," Papoutsis alleged. "Moreover, there are people on the payroll, relatives of Mr Panigyris, who were paid by the municipality for work they never undertook, as well as other strange irregularities".

Based on the allegations by Papoutsis and other residents of Kastellorizo, the former Supreme Court prosecutor Evangelos Kroustalakis ordered, in spring 2003, that Rhodes prosecutors undertake a preliminary investigation. The case was frozen until this summer, when the investigation started up again. The brief is now at the interrogation stage and is expected to come before the court soon.

Kathimerini spoke to Kastellorizo Mayor Pavlos Panigyris and asked for his side of the story as most of the allegations concern him and his intimates. On the encroachments, Panigyris said that, "personally, I have never taken over any expanse of land. The municipality simply provides a certificate for real estate levies (TAP) and has no other involvement. As for the alleged encroachments on public land, the competent body will decide". He categorically denied all other accusations. "Legal proceedings are started when there are accusations with the purpose of finding out if they are well-founded. I will furnish proof of my innocence during the hearings. I believe that this attack on me has been made by Mr Papoutsis and four to five other people for political reasons. Moreover, I've been elected for three consecutive terms and with overwhelming majority at that".

Your Property on Kastellorizo

With the advent of a greater appeal to the Australian born Kazzies since the rediscovery of their heritage, many are now investigating the family properties. They are horrified to find that after finally locating the house or land belonging to them, locals are occupying (squatting) there, many for years. Despite having proof of ownership, usually by a "Prikosifono", the question of right of possession can end up in courts of Rodos, usually with a shonky solicitor acting on your behalf. There is alleged, an element on the island that have excised vacant land, mostly with derelict old houses, having been sacked and destroyed through the ravages of two world wars. They have the happy knack of converting any vulnerable properties for their own usage.

Houses which have been occupied for 15 years are deemed to automatically belong to the squatters and is sufficient proof to enable transfer. This situation to my knowledge has never been tested in the Greek Courts, although there are instances where sub tenants of the original inhabitants can be challenged and forced to vacate, providing that they have been there for a lesser period. A recent case in point was of the house of the Kondousoglous family of Adelaide, beneficiaries of Thia Fiola, passed on to her daughter Alexandria, and then on to Daphne Miriklis, of the next generation, she in turn sold her interest to a cousin, Marcus Michael of Perth, he was then able to negotiate (for a fee) the sub tenants to vacate, and since improvements to the house had been effected the fee paid as per compensation was certainly better and less costly than dragging through the courts of Rodos. For your information, I have been fortunate to be introduced by Jack Yeronikolas, his own business solicitor a highly respected citizen and ex Mayor of Rodos, George Vrouhos who is reasonably fluent in English, he has been keen to visit Australia, by way of discovery; and with the mission of visiting the capital cities where he will give his views of the way to overcome the obstacles whether there has been wrongful habitation, or unravelling family squabbles as to inheritance.

In closing I speak as the voice of experience, having been through the mill from proof of ownership, building and sorting out the families' expectations.

Wedding of Louise Katris to Yiorgo Karayannis Kastellorizo 24 October 2004



For most of us, Kastellorizo is like Never-Never-Land. Megisti represents the hopes, dreams and imaginations of our parents and grandparents. Growing up within the Kastellorizian diaspora, you knew your parents grandparents secretly held aspirations that when the time came, their Kastellorizian offspring would marry Kastellorizian. It is within this magical world, between myth and reality that the nuptials of Louise, daughter of Maria Katris, grand-daughter of Con and Chrissie Adgemis of Mentone and Yiorgo Karayannis, son of Kyriako and Varvara of Kastellorizo were sanctified.

For most of us, a trip to the birth place of our ancestors is a trip down memory lane. My trip was much, much more. From the moment I saw the limani as the ferry maneuvered into the minute harbour, I could feel the sense of excitement and weight of historic inevitability wash over me.

The island was resplendent in nostalgia. Wedding fever on Kastellorizo is like yellow fever in Shanghi. It takes no prisoners and whether you are a local, a visiting Australian Kastellorizian or just a tourist you can feel the sense of hysteria and chaos, which surrounds wedding preparations.

The wedding preparations were like no other, the entire island offered their opinion regarding all issues as they considered themselves expert on all things from dressing the hall, flower arrangements and wedding dresses to how many goats were needed to feed the entire island and all the visiting Turks. Around every corner, behind every doorway and under every bougainvillea, all anyone could discuss was "The Wedding".

As the bride and her mother promenaded around the limani, it would take anywhere between one and three hours to answer questions and to take and disregard opinions.

The invitations were sent out in the form of a "Kouloura". Young boys were sent to every house to deliver and invite every person on the island. The next day the young girls of the island went to every house with a verbal invitation to the wedding and to the "Krevati" (bed-making). Island politics were swept under every hand made carpet as custom demanded unity.

The krevati was all one expected and more. The house was rocked by the nervous anticipation of all those who came to enjoy and participate. This was no small family affair. Businesses closed so that all could attend, make clove bracelets, drink rose water, east strava and katoumaria and sing songs wishing the young couple luck, health, fertility and prosperity.

The "Votana" were gathered and wedding song filled the air. Excitement gained momentum and reached fever pitch. This was wedding week! Yiorgo and his family and the bride's family sailed around Megisti singing songs of love and longing. Louise stood on the harbour, waiting for her groom. As I stood next to her, I felt a wave of fear for there was no escape.

By the "Savatovratho" (Saturday night before the wedding) the bishop had arrived, the clove water was ready for Louise to wash Yiorgo's hair, the goats had been slaughtered, the Bride's Pilafi and chickens were cooked and the sound of the bouzouki filled the air. This was no ordinary night. groom's family sang songs of conquest reminiscent of the halcyon years. They challenged the brides' family and thankfully Manoli Geronikolas answered the challenge, making the most jaded widow giggle in fond nostalgia! Personally, I had to resort to my Greek dictionary, as such an education, I did not receive from my parents. We danced until we could dance no more and we sang until we could sing no more, but we seemed to have an unquenchable appetite for post Savatovratho analysis.

The wedding day dawned and Kastellorizo shone. The peaceful dawn that awoke me was shattered by a cry that could mean only one of two things. No, the Turks were not invading, but Varvara was up making sure everything was perfect for her son's big day.

Given the remoteness of the island, there was work to be done before the festivities. The goats had to be cooked, the church and hall dressed, the flowers arranged and any last minute tasks had to be undertaken. These were executed with military precision because the slightest slip-up would mean Varvara's wrath and no one dared defy the Queen of Kastellorizo!

Louise was not allowed a moment to herself. On Kastellorizo, the residents of the island have to dress both the bride and the groom. A quiet moment for Louise and her mother was snatched as the bridesmaids prepared the stefania and the koufetta

A wave of acclamation spread through the crowd as the breathtakingly beautiful veiled bride was led out of her home, on the proud arm of her brother George and her mother, Maria.

Louise was serenaded to church by the fiddler and piano accordionist. Close behind her walked representatives of the Adgemis, Katris families and friends. The harbour was filled with yachts and boats that came from their friends in Turkey. As we passed each door, another person emerged. A procession led Louise to the church of Saint Constantine and Eleni.

Louise and Yiorgo walked in the steps of their ancestors. We could hear the approving echoes of the generations that had traveled this road before and we could see their laughter in the faces of the people.

Louise and Yiorgo's marriage was blessed by Bishop Chrisostomos and Father Yiorgi in the presence of the community that is Kastellorizo. As I looked around the church, I recognised many familiar faces from home. I saw the faces of the generations that had been and were to come and was proud that I was able to share in that moment.

breakfast The wedding was unprecedented. This was no Greek celebration, it was a Kastellorizian extravaganza! We ate, we sang, we laughed, we danced, we screamed, we cried. Never since the official visit of Suleiman the Great's grand vizier in 1367 have so many "Turks" visited the island, without the grotto being sealed to protect the island's honour. This was a wedding that the generations to come will remember. These are the stories our grandchildren will remember, when they too, visit the island.

At the threshold of the bridal suite Yiorgo and Louise were fed walnuts and honey by Varvara, to help make their life sweet. We watched transfixed, as husband and wife were released from the bosom of the community.



In September 2004, the Sunday Age chose to interview the six young Melbournians above for a four page feature article on "Generation Y". Nick Verginis (son of Jasmin Verginis and George Verginis) and Nick's wife, Sarah Austin, were among the six interviewed.

Some small (and large) excerpts follow:

'Tuned in, turned off. They're young, smart, and have the world at their feet. But do they really want it? To generation-Y (aged 13 to 28) the world is an uncertain place- and for many of them, that's not such a bad thing.'

In the interview Nick is quoted, "Our generation thinks anything is possible because we look past constraints imposed on previous generations. We hear the economic rationalist theology which dogs people 30 to 40, but we are not taken in by it. We are realistic, so that when management talks like that, we see through it." Professor Johanna Wyn, the director of Melbourne University's Australian Youth Resources Centre, which has studied 2000 Y-gen twentysomethings, agrees. "They have their eyes wide open," she says. 'They really are looking at things differently to previous generations. They are the most educated young people ever and they have been made to stay at school longer." She calls them the "Don't Lock Me In Generation".

"They understand there's no point putting all your hope in one thing, because everything is changing," she says, "They don't want to be stamped with a label, like 'plumber'. That's the old model. It doesn't fit the world. They opt for experience. They're secretly smarter than we think." Smarter and clear-eyed, and visionary enough to garner the tag 'echo boomers'. This is a reference to the fact that many were born to baby boomer parents, and have, on the surface at least, '60s-like' traits. But whereas challenging the hype of powerful institutions tended to be a

boomer fad, it can be a way of survival for Y-gen, which has been so hammered by marketing that they side-step spin.'

This Article appeared in the Age the week Nick gave up a future partnership possibility in a city law firm for a significantly lesser paying position in the legal branch of the Premier's Department of the Victorian Government. At night he studies Policy and other political subjects.

Louie captains the centurions

Collingwood's legendary 1953 premiership captain Lou Richards was named captain of the Greek Team of the Century, at the Athlos gala charity dinner last Thursday.

The Richards-Pannam dy-nasty, which boasts the greatest family record in VFL/AFL history, had an astounding five representatives in the team, including Ron Richards as coach.

Over 530 people attended the lavish black-tie event, including sports minister Justin Madden, Lord Mayor John So, media personality Red Symons, and most of the 55 VFL/AFL players of Hellenic background. Ath-los patron and AFL CEO Andrew Demetriou was named on the wing. In his address he declared that "I doubt we will ever have this experience ever again in our lifetime"

TV news presenters Angela Pippos and George Donikian hosted the event. Pippos summed up the mood of the evening, announcing that, "The Brownlow is for blondes. But tonight is for brunettes!

Over \$50,000 was raised for the Hellenic Australian Sports Foundation scholarships, to be granted to young Greek sportspeople.
The Greek Team of the

Century was selected by the Athlos committee, headed by chairman Chris Pavlou, the former Carlton winger and current board member. They also consulted football legends Ron Barassi and David Parkin.

There was a total of 55 players to choose from, who played 3,521 games for 2,997 goals between them. Thirteen players represented Victoria, and elev-en were premiership players. Murray Thompson MP presented the players with commemorative jumpers and medallions.

Peter Daicos and Anthony Koutoufides were named as vice-captains of the team. Daicos is one of the most revered players in the history of the game, and was named at Full Forward. He kicked 549 career goals, including 97 goals in Colling-wood's famous 1990 premiership season. Daicos said he was proud to be there "to honour the sacrifices that my parents

Koutoufides is Carlton's captain, a premiership player, all-Australian representative and AFLPA award winner. He said. "It's a great honour for me to be presented with this and be alongside some superstars It's an honour that I'll look back at forever in my

Both proudly received



their awards with their families in the audience, before being mobbed for autographs and photos.

Hawthorn's Angelo Lek-kas was the other current player to make the team However Geelong midfielder Paul Koulouriotis was presented with the Hellenic Australian Sports Foundation 'Player of the future award.' Koulouriotis is the newest Greek sensa-tion in the AFL. Since breaking into the Geelong side in round 17, he has collected at least 22 possessions in each of his last four games, and been amongst the best on ground. He will be a vital link in the Cats finals as-

There were surprises in the heritage eligibility of some players. Most notably was the blond hair blue-eyed Russell Morris named at centre-half-back. His great-great-great-great grandfather was Greek. "So I'm Greek!" said the 159 game premiership and all-Australian player. Morris announced that he was even vilified on the field when called a "wog poofter". Luke Beveridge qualified

on the interchange as his grandfather came from Sa-

The Richards' grandfather Charlie Pannam (shortened from Pannamopoulos) was Greek, and six of the family played a record 939 VFL games, kicking 1184 goals and winning 8 premierships between them. Lou was unable to attend the event but his little brother Ron accepted the honour on his behalf. Ron was also named as coach of the 'Greek Team of the Century; having coached the Magpies reserves to a premiership and being the only undefeated senior coach

There was another family connection in the team, with cousins George Lakes and Vasil Varlamos being named in the back pocket and half back flank respec-

Scholarship funds were raised by the auction of many items and memorabil-ia. One eager fan, believed to be a prominent committee member, bid a total of \$12,000 for Pavart paintings of Daicos and Koutoufides plus a signed commemorative jumper

Sports Minister Justin Madden celebrated the evening with a 'toast to all things Greek', and said he "wouldn't be surprised to see similar nights like this coming out of many other cultural groups, because of the great success that this has been".

One thing is certain; it was Greek footy's night of
