The, Kastellorizian of the Year for 2009 will be awarded to John Basil Salvaris, OAM, who I am sure that you will agree is a worthy recipient of this award and meets all the criteria as previously outline in the selection criteria.

THE 2009 KASTELLORIZIAN OF THE YEAR

Mr. John Basil Salvaris, OAM



John Basil Salvaris was born on 23/05/30, in Port Said, Egypt to Kastellorizians, Vasilios and Evangelia (Miriklis) Salvaris. John spent his childhood and youth with his parents and younger brother, Andrew, in Port Said.

John attended the Greek Orthodox College of Port Said where he became fluent in Greek, English, French and Arabic. During this time John was also an active member of the Scouts. He completed his Baccalaureate in Egypt in 1948. This qualification gave him a place to study at the University of Athens, Greece and the University of Alexandria, Egypt. However the political climate in Egypt and Greece was unsettled and the family decided to follow the migratory path of Vasilios's brothers and sister to and immigrate to Australia. John was the first of his immediate family to arrive in Australia and a few years later was joined a by his parents and brother, Andrew. The family was active in the Greek community in Melbourne and would often visit the Kastellorizian Club in Lonsdale St.

John's school certificates from Egypt were not accepted in Australia and he enrolled in the equivalent of year 12 at George Taylor's and Staff College where he competed his Matriculation. John then studied Applied Chemistry at RMIT.

John's first job was at the Commonwealth Serum Laboratories (CSL) where he work as a Research Scientist on polio myelitis. Later in John's career, Scientific he became Technical Superintendent and Director of Research at Boral Kinnears. John's project at Kinnears included the investigation of materials and processes related to the design and manufacture of company products such as ropes and threads, synthetic fibres, carpets, artificial lawn and artificial ligaments for use in human surgery. During his career, he under took Post Graduate Diploma in Management at RMIT and was active member of the Australasian Chemical Institute and Chair Person of Western District Productivity Group and a committee member of the Australian Standards Committee for the revision of Australian Standards for yarns and fibre ropes.

John married Stella Christopher, the second daughter Christos and Paraskevi (Theodore) Christopher. They have three children; Evelyn, Basil and Priscilla and two grandchildren, John and Christina. Their son, Basil lives in Sydney and is married to Josephine Lo Ricco. Priscilla and her Partner, Steve Newlands live in Melbourne.

However between John's career and family, he also dedicated time to the Greek, Kastellorizian and Australian communities.

In the 1970's John was an active member of the Hawthorn Lions Club and was a member of the Greek Professional Association and he later their Vice President.

Experiencing the passing of his parents and his participation in both Greek and Australian organizations, he became aware of the urgent need for facilities for the care of Greek speaking Elderly. He prepared and submitted to the Australian Government a report and plan of action, outlining and emphasizing the urgency for Ethno specific facilities for the care of migrant elderly and the need for financial assistance.

He then established and registered an organization (The Greek Australian Society for the Care of the Elderly (GASCE) under the Patronage of the Governor of Victoria.

John was the Greek Australian Society for the Care of the Elderly Foundation President from 1976- 1987. During the 10 years of his Presidency, GASCE:

- raised by appeal from the Greek Community and the wider Australian Community, \$300,000;
- secured an Australian Government Grant of \$600,000 (In the 1980's these sums of money was substantial):
- purchased property in Clayton to build the Hostel Built and fitted out and commence running "Pronia Elderly Hostel" and
- applied for further government funding to extend the Hostel into a Nursing Home.

In 1988 John received an OAM for services to the Elderly and Greek Community.

Despite his busy schedule, John also found time to actively participate in the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria and he continues to do so today. John served as Committee member in the late 1980's and early 1990's. During this time he also took on the role of Treasurer.

It is ironic that during his time on the Kastellorizian committee, John was one of the key initiators of the Kastellorizian of the Year Award.

Following resignation from the main committee, John has continued to support of the Association through his involvement on numerous subcommittees including the Sub-committee for the review of the Rules of the Association (20007-8). He has given many historical lectures about Kastellorizo.

John is passionate about Kastellorizo and visited the island with his wife, Stella in 1996. He is an advocator of the preservation of historical and cultural knowledge about Kastellorizo. He is regular contributor to the Historical section of the Kazzie News, the official newsletter of the Kastellorizian Association of Victoria. He is also interested in the Kastellorizian diaspora in Australia.

He is keen to record and preserve how the Kastellorizians and their descendants have contributed to Australian history and society.

John's love of history does not end with Kastellorizian history. His other historical passion is Byzantine history. He combines this interest with his on going involvement in the Australian community as he is currently a voluntary Lecturer in Byzantine History for the University of the 3 Age (U3A) at the Swinburne campus in Hawthorn. John has held the lectureship at U3a position since his retirement.

John is also a Member of the Australian Association for Byzantine Studies and has written and presented papers to them on Byzantium.

John enjoys spending time with his family and visiting his grandchildren in Sydney.

"So you think you know who you are? Or do you?"

At some stage in our lives our children and grandchildren or even we will ask, "Where do we come from?" "Who are our ancestors?" and "Where can I find out more?" Regretfully, we wished that we had asked these questions whilst our parents and grandparents were still alive. Sometimes we do get the opportunity to find out but fail to record and preserve it for the generations to come.

Sourcing information about our Kastellorizo heritage is difficult as records on Kastellorizo were either destroyed or are written in Greek with Kazzie and Turkish terms which are meaningless now. The best way conserve this knowledge is to act now.

Allan Cresswell is Kastellorizian on his maternal side and spent many years recording his own family tree which he placed on the Web. The Association then approached Allan to create a separate Kastellorizian Genealogical Website based on the information he had already collected for his own family tree. Since the conception of the Kastellorizian Genealogy Website last year, the site now contains over 10,000 names and many photographs. Kastellorizian Association of Vic Social Report

Inaugural Art Exhibition

On Sunday the 15 th of March at approximately 2.30pm there was silence at Kastellorizian House. The Committee and Artists were all reflecting on whether the Inaugural Art Exhibition would be a success or failure. Half an hour later, at 3pm our first guest arrived, followed by the next one and the next one and the next one. This trend continued for the duration of the Exhibition. By the end of the day we all knew the answer to our earlier queries. Bingo! We pulled it off!

Mid last year, on a trip to Melbourne to visit his children, Jack Condous from Adelaide visited the Kastellorizian Association and showed us his photographic works.

After a lot of thought, the committee decided that an Art Exhibition would be a novel yet ambitious event to present to our members, in particularly the younger generation.

Thus the Committee then contacted Jack and Beryl Georgakopoulos, who's beautiful Mediterranean theme inspired water colours would compliment Jack's photographs of Kastellorizo well. We invited them to exhibit their works at our Exhibition. We were very pleased when both artists agreed to participate in our Art Exhibition. They were extremely happy for the exposure and on hearing the Kastellorizian Association was to sponsor the event and cover the costs, they both kindly offered to donate part of their sales proceeds to the Association.

As this was the first time that the Association had staged and sponsored such an event, the Committee considered the show as an experiment.

The planning to get to the exhibition took three months. With minimal funds, we had to source the best venue for our event. The obvious choice was our clubrooms.

Then there were many emails and phone calls with the artists to work out how many works would be displayed and the area of space was required and what would best support the works. Once this was calculated, it was time to shop for display stands.

After many quotes the display stands were book.

Hooray! Time to rest.

No way!

It was time to notify our members and quests.

The next major dilemma was how long do we run the event. Knowing that many art exhibitions take place over a few days to many weeks, it became clear to the Committee that it was not a possibility. Participation in the event was voluntary and we did not have the personnel to staff the event for an extended period of time. The Sin of Strabon: Kisthini the Lost City

The geographer, Strabon (67 to 23 AD) reported that on an island in the Lycian Sea there was a city called "Kisthini".

For a long time, many geographers and historians questioned whether the city was located on the island of Megisti (Kastellorizo).

This question arose due to the interpretation of Strabon's manuscript. The translation from Strabon in Geographia XIV 3,7 reads "between the many islands and ports referred to in our sailing account is an island Megisti and a city with the same name "Kisthini". As it reads, the passage is ambiguous. One can not be sure if the word "megisti" is used as a noun or an adjective.

If "Megisti" is used as a noun, then it represents the name of the island on which there is a town named "Kisthini". However, if "megisti" is used as an adjective, then the word megisti means a large island on which there is a town "Kisthini" that shares the same name as the island. It is obvious that there is a "Lagouma" or omission in the text in which the scribe omitted one or more words. There is no way of verifying this, then Strabon must carry the sin.

Other ancient travellers mention in passing the name "Kisthini" but according to Adamtios Korais, a leading 18 century intellect, they were mislead by the sin of Strabon. Later travellers also mention Kisthini as an island, somewhere in the Lycian Sea and Amish Tarieu writes" Sailing by the shores of Lycia, we can identify the island, Megisti which has one town by the same name and in addition one island named Kisthini"

A. Diamandaras a Kastellorizian school teacher spent many years surveying the Island for evidence of an amphitheatre mentioned by Strabon or the use of the name Ksthini" but alas found neither. Another school teacher at the turn of the century was so enthusiastic that he changed his name to "Kisthinios"

In 1996, Dr Normal G Ashton of the University of Western Australia published a manuscript "Ancient Megisti, the forgotten Kastellorizo". He reports the results of a surface archeological survey of Kastellorizo conducted under the guidance of the Australian Archeological Institute in Athens. Archeological evidence dating from the BC era were established but nothing indicated the existence of a theatre or town named Kisthini.

Dr Ashton's archeological survey did confirm the existence of submarine archeological remains in the Bay of Mandraki. This site was first reported in the Palameria region by P.Pirazzoli in 1987. He reports the presence of an ancient ramp and roadway that leads down to where the ancient shore line, docks and boat building site of once existed. These ancient structures in the Bay of Mandraki supports the idea the submerged area may have also consisted of a town. Further excavation is required to confirm this. Perhaps here below the modern day shore line, with further archeological excavations, we may discover that Strabon's city of Kisthini did exist on Kastellorizo.

The history of the Kisthinos family of Sweden

About a year ago I had a sudden "urge" to look up my last name on the internet and see what Google could tell me. Since I new that my family was the only family on this planet with the last name Kisthinios I was very happy to see that a sister of my grandfather was to be found in the genealogical pages of Kastellorizo presented Allan Cresswell in bγ Australia (www.castellorizo.org/). Her name was Chrisanthi Kisthiniou. What a lovely moment to understand and find out that through her I was connected to people that now had names and sometimes photos presented on this lovely site! I quickly found out that I was related to the families Malaxos and Karantonis.

Now finding this site brought back all kinds of memories and stories I was told as a child by my father and my aunt. Stories about my grandfather

Nikolaos Kisthinios from Kastellorizo (born around 1900) that left Kastellorizo to study in Russia to become a doctor. Stories about my great grandfather loannis (a priest) and his father (Emmanouil) being a teacher just like my father loannis that unfortunately passed away eighteen years ago!

So here I sat in Sweden, thinking of how I ended up here. Well, as many family stories our story is a story of people moving from one place to another finding opportunities or circumstances that suited there bettern to be the context and the context and

The story I was told, was as I mentioned having a grandfather (Nikolaos) from Kastellorizo that went to Russia to study, then marrying Thalia from Kos and having four children, three of them born in Paris where my grandfather worked. Later on they left and went back to Greece this time to Athens. Unfortunately Nikolaos died and left his wife and four children in an as we all know desperate time in Greece (1940 approximately). My father was the second of these children and was of course devastated. He was by the time 10 years old. Later on, as a young adult he went to study in Switzerland where he met my mother from Sweden; Anna-Lena. So now you know how I ended up in Sweden...later in life I

I emigrated to Greece (to find my roots), stayed for 10 years but returned to Sweden since my genes from Kastellorizo shouted loud and clear; YOU NEED TO STUDY!!! I think you will not be surprised to find out that I'm a teacher at the University of Malmö, Sweden today.

Now all these years later I tried to remember everything I knew about Kastellorizo...for example that there was an ancestor called Malaxoudia (true or false) that played an important role during the occupation of the Turks. I dug up some photos supposedly of my grandfathers home in Kastellorizo. All these stories, photos and memories blurred into a somewhat magic feeling about that island far away. At this time I also saw the famous movie "Mediterraneo" and was fascinated. How I would like to take my son (his name is loannis of course) to Kastellorizo. I also remembered a "strange" newspaper that was sent to my father every now and then called I think "Ta Kastelloriziaka Nea".

When I think about it now, it is amazing that his connection to this wonderful island was that strong and apparently he left this heritage to me since I'm now writing an article in a newsletter called "Kazzie News"!

My new friends in Australia are the Christofas family in Melbourne and their daughter Lisa now living in Malmö, Sweden! However the internet is a wonderful research tool and all Kastellorizians and Greeks can calm down. On the blog site, Skyscrapercity forum troubled Greek



KAZZIE KERASMA

Easter has arrived!

In the Greek Orthodox calendar, Easter is the most revered, spiritual and "celebrated" time of the year. During this time, a series of rituals, traditions and culinary delights are performed under the governance by the Greek Orthodox faith.

The observance of the Greek Orthodox Easter period commences 40 days prior to Easter Sunday, with the Great Lent.

The scriptures as interpreted by the Greek Orthodox Church guides the participants through this time of year. It commences with Apokries, or "meat fare" and is held on the Sunday before Katharo Theftera (clean Monday), the first day of lent. Aporkries is last day of indulgence in food and celebration and is also known as Mardi Gras.

The following week is "cheese fare", during this time the participant cannot eat meat but can still eat dairy, eggs, fish, shellfish, wine and oil¹.

The weeks following leading up to Eater Sunday are considered days of "strict" fast and a vegan diet is followed and excludes meat, fish, eggs, dairy, wine and oil¹. If the participant wishes to take communion prior to Easter, this "strict" diet must also be followed.

There are a few exceptions to the "strict" fast. On Saturday and Sunday during Lent, wine and oil can be include in the diets, whilst Palm Sunday and the 25th of March fish can also be eaten¹. The fast is broken on Easter Sunday with the announcement that "Christ has Risen" or Xritos Anesti.

The motivations to follow the "Great Fast" is one of personal choice and the reasons may range from religious and spiritual beliefs, traditional and cultural ties or simply a desire to follow a more healthy diet.

To anyone with an interest in food, this time of year is a culinary delight. The Lenten diet is one where the participant embarks on vegetarian and vegan diet. This diet makes up the bulk of what is considered the Healthy Mediterranean Diet. But the true vegan Mediterranean diet takes time to prepare. There is a need to soak many of the pulses, legumes and lentils overnight. However modern life in Australia is very hectic and involve a heavy work and school schedule making it difficult to participate in the rigors of Lent and the preparation of the such a diet.

One other problem faced by young families is the difficulty to convince young children to eat vegetables, legumes and lentils. It is also hard to prepare lunches for school with out alienating them from there peers in the school grounds.

As Easter in Australia is synonymous with Chocolate and is often a child's favourite sweet. I have selected to share with you a Chocolate recipe that that fits the criteria for Lent. This cake is also a great school lunch treat, makes a great birthday cake and one which every chocolate loving adult will also enjoy.

Lenten Chocolate cake with Oil

560 g sifted all-purpose flour 600 g white sugar 85 g unsweetened cocoa powder 235 ml vegetable oil 710 ml water 15 g baking soda 3 g salt 45 ml vanilla extract

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C), and grease and flour a 9x13 inch pan.
- 2. In a large bowl, sift together flour, cocoa powder, soda and salt. Add sugar and mix together
- Add oil, water and vanilla and mix thoroughly for 2-5 minutes using a mixer.
- 4. Pour into a 9x13 inch pan.
- 5. Bake at 350 degrees F (175 degrees C) for an hour or until toothpick inserted in centre comes out clean.
- Sprinkle with icing sugar and serve

Paul Zervos honoured by the Italian Government One of Castellorizo's well known elders, Paul Zervos, was recently honoured by the Italian Government and made a Knight (Cavaliere) of the Order of the Star of Italian Solidarity (ORDINE DELLA STELLA DELLA SOLIDARIETA ITALIANA).
